Welcome to the 2018 Alliance-INEE Roundtable: A framework for supporting integrated programming!

The Inter-Agency Network of Education in Emergencies (INEE) and the Alliance for Child Protection in Humanitarian Action (The Alliance), in partnership with Elevate Children Funders Group and International Education Funders Group, are co-hosting this roundtable.

The theme for this event is “A Framework for Collaboration between Child Protection and Education in Humanitarian Contexts”. As part of this initiative, we have invited humanitarian actors to share their experiences and/or innovative ideas related to integrated programming across the two sectors in humanitarian/emergency contexts. This event is a forum where practitioners, researchers, donors, and policy makers can gather to learn from each other and be kept abreast of new developments in both sectors.

SPEAKERS

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Bo Viktor Nylund, Ph.D.

Bo Viktor Nylund is a human rights, protection and legal practitioner who has spent two decades on advocacy and engagement with state and non-state actors, with a view to promoting accountability in the implementation of development and humanitarian programming. His experience includes Protection Officer with the Office of the High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) in Geneva and Kenya/Somalia (1994–1996), Head of Child Rights and Business for UNICEF’s Division for Private Fundraising and Partnerships, and UNICEF Representative in Burundi (2015-2017). Since 2017, Bo has served as UNICEF’s Deputy Regional Director for Eastern and Southern Africa where he leads, supervises and manages teams of technical advisors in support of 21 country offices in the Eastern and Southern Africa Region.

Yasmine Sherif, LL.M.

Yasmine Sherif has over 25 years’ experience across the humanitarian, development and peacekeeping spectrum, having served in some of the most crisis-affected countries and regions on the globe. A lawyer specialising in International Humanitarian Law and Human Rights Law (LL.M.), her expertise has been sought by the United Nations (UNHCR, UNDP, OCHA); international NGOs; and Long Island University’s Masters Programme on the UN, humanitarian assistance and human rights. Yasmine has published extensively on international humanitarian and development issues, as well as international law. She is the author of the book *The Case for Humanity: An Extraordinary Session*, which was launched at the United Nations in New York in 2015, is a Huffington Post blogger, and has appeared in the media in Scandinavia, the US and Canada. She is currently the Director of Education Cannot Wait (ECW).

Jonas Habimana, M.A.

Jonas Habimana is from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) with more than 12 years' experience in water hygiene, food security, health and nutrition, education and child protection. He has worked with numerous humanitarian organisations, including World Vision, Solidarités International, Tear Fund, Save the Children, Christian Aid, MEDAIR and Action Against Hunger (ACF). In 2004, he co-founded BIFERD, an NGO implementing Emergency Relief and Development projects in DRC. In addition to consulting, Jonas is currently serving as BIFERD's Executive Director and a SPHERE standards focal point in the Eastern DRC. He is a member of both the INEE and the Alliance.

Joan Lombardi, Ph.D.

Over the past 40 years, Joan has made significant contributions in the areas of child and family policy as an author, a public servant and an innovative leader and policy advisor to national and international organizations and foundations. Among other positions, Joan served as the first Deputy Assistant Secretary for Early Childhood Development in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Service (2009-2011), the Deputy Assistant Secretary for Policy and External Affairs in Administration for Children and Families and the first Commissioner of the Child Care Bureau (1993-1998). Her current roles include Visiting Scholar at the FXB Center for Health and Human Rights, T.H. Chan School of Public Health, Harvard University; director of Early Opportunities LLC, a philanthropic advisement service focused on the development of young children, families and the communities that support them; and Guest Editor of Early Childhood Matters, the journal of the Bernard van Leer Foundation.

Bornwell Kantande, B.A.

Bornwell Kantande is currently the Head of Office at UNHCR Regional Service Center - Nairobi. Before his arrival in April 2018, he was the UNHCR Representative to Uganda where he served for three years. He has served UNHCR for over thirty years and has managed some of the biggest refugee operations such as Ethiopia, Uganda, Sudan, Malawi and Mozambique. He also served for six years at UNHCR headquarters in Geneva where he was the Head of the Programme Management Training Unit under the Division of Operational Support. The Training Team was responsible for equipping UNHCR staff and partners in the design, planning, implementation of UNHCR operations in the field applying the Results-Based Management and Community-Based Approaches. He is a holder of a Bachelor's of Science Degree in Computer Science and Statistics from the University of Malawi. He is married to one wife and is blessed with two sons and two grandchildren.

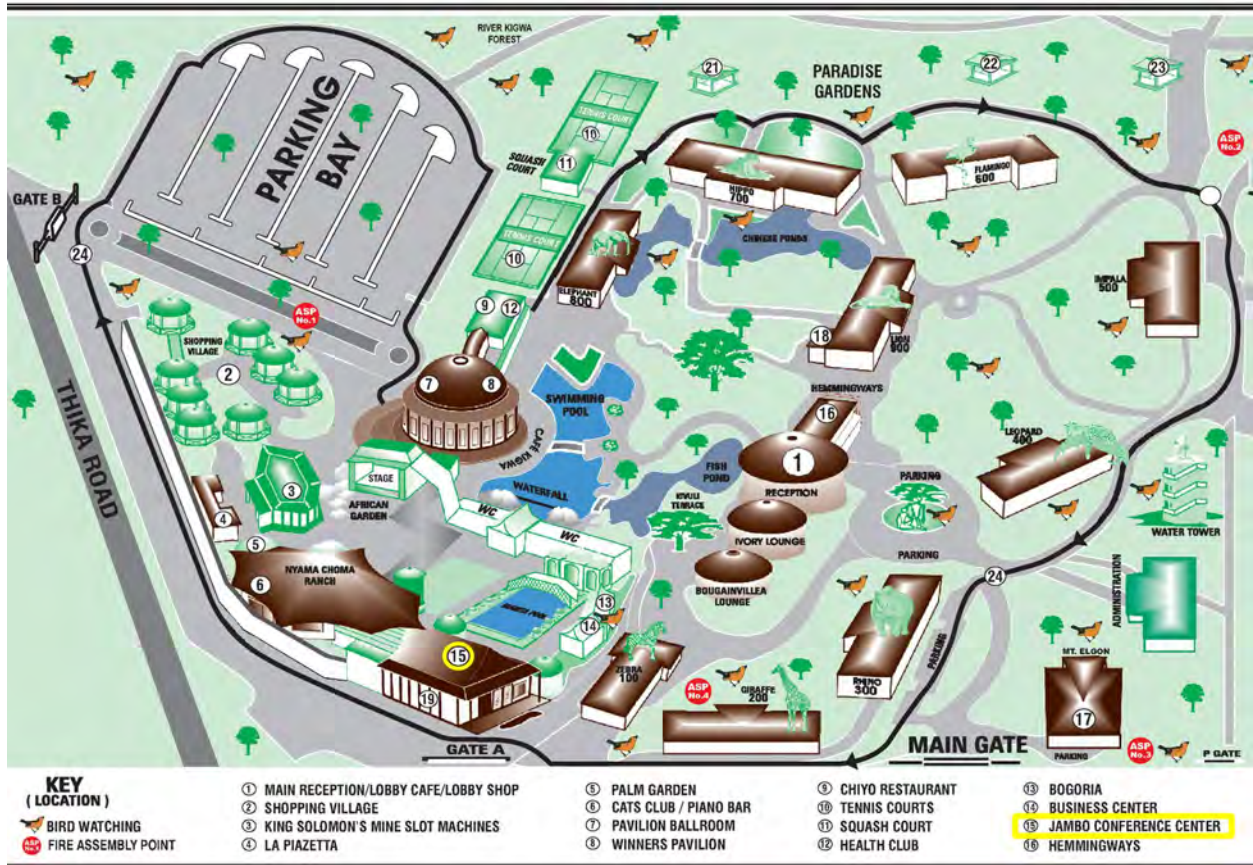
